STOP Enus Alfi's Removal

NO DEPORTATIONS!
FIGHT RACIST IMMIGRATION LAWS



ENUS ALI is one of hundreds of black people threatened with removal' or 'deportation' by the Home Office under the racist immigration laws. He, like many others, has decided to publicly fight back against this threat and for his right to remain in this country.

Enus Ali came to this country from Bangladesh in 1976 when he was 14 after waiting over two years for permission to join his father. Tragically his father had died before Enus and his mother were allowed to join him. Enus and his mother were given leave to remain for an indefinate period, and had their passports checked again by the Home Office two weeks after they came here.

Last October, after SIX YEARS of silence, immigration officials gave Enus Ali a removal notice. They said he was an "Illegal Entrant" because he did not tell them his father was dead when he arrived here. This was the first Enus had heard about him being "Illegal". Enus cannot appeal against this decision to any court of law or tribunal. He can be removed at any time. Yet how could a 14 year old boy from Bangladesh know he was breaking Britain's immigration laws.

In December, the Home Office wrote to Enus Ali's M.P. saying:
"Mr Enus Ali claimed that he did not realise the significance of his father's death at the time. This may be true since he was only 13 or 14 years old." Two months later the House of Lords decided that a person is not an "illegal Immigrant" unless they deliberately deceived immigration officials. But the Home Office is still planning to deport Enus Ali!

The same inhuman, racist laws that are being used to attack Enus Ali are also being used to threaten hundreds of other black people with deportation and to keep black families divided on the flimsiest of 'evidence'. In Manchester, ANTHONY BROWN, PARVEEN KHAN and her children, MANJIT KAUR and her daughter PALBINDER and IRANIAN STUDENTS are all fighting back against deportation threats as are many others throughout the country. A large-scale campaign to re-unite BANGLADESHI, FAMILIES was started last year in Oldham.
