We are not defeated. The Home Secretary often says "No" at first. Maybe he hopes that the campaigners will give up and that the person threatened with deportation will pack her bags and go. More pressure from you is the best method of changing his mind.

We need your help to stop the Home Office deporting Rashida Abedi

She came to Britain in 1981 from Quetta in Pakistan to cure her deafness, which was caused by meningitis ten years ago. Unfortunately the treatment was unsuccessful.

In Quetta there are no facilities for the deaf. Her mother is elderly and no-one else is available to look after her. She is now living in South Norwood with Syed her elder brother, and sister and their family. Syed has supported her financially since her father's death. They all want Rashida to stay.

The Home Office say that sisters are not really part of the family, and cannot be considered 'dependents'. They have to be 'distressed' before they will be allowed to stay. The Home Office say Rashida is not distressed enough. They are making her return to a country where she would find it very difficult to overcome her disability. As Rashida says, here she has the chance to learn "to be able to work and do something for the country and for other people".

Rashida is caught by a particularly complex immmigration rule. Like most immigration laws, it affects black people most. They are more likely to be forcibly separated from their families by deportation.

The Home Secretary has often changed his mind to allow someone to stay when enough people have protested.
