

STOP AURANGZEB'S REMOVAL!

Aurangzeb is threatened with removal from this country though he has lived here for nearly twelve years, because of an indiscretion for which he was not responsible, committed when he was a child of thirteen. This removal is inhuman and will divide his family (wife and two young British-born children). Aurangzeb is yet another victim of blatantly racist laws. Show your support for Aurangzeb by attending the public meeting. Show your opposition to these racist laws. Fight Racism, Fight for Aurangzeb's right to stay with his wife and children.

اورنگزیب کو اس ملک میں رہتے ہوئے ۱۲ برس ہو چکے ہیں اورنگزیب کو ۱۳ سال کی عمر میں اُس کے والدین نے کسی دوسرے آدمی کے پاسپورٹ کے ذریعے اس ملک میں بھیجا تھا ۱۹۷۹ میں اورنگزیب نے یہاں شادی کرنی۔ اس شادی سے اُن کے دو بچے ہیں۔ اب ہوم آفس اورنگزیب اور اُن کے بیوی بچوں کو اس ملک سے لگانے کی کوشش کر رہا ہے۔ اورنگزیب کی عمر ۱۳ سال تھی جب وہ اس ملک میں آئے تھے۔ اب اورنگزیب اور اُن کے بیوی بچوں کو اس جرم کی سزا کیوں دی جا رہی ہے؟ یہ ظلم صرف ہوم آفس کی نسل پرستی کی وجہ سے ہو رہا ہے۔ کمپین جیتنے کیلئے ہمیں آپکی مدد کی ضرورت ہے۔

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Aurangzeb has been living in Bradford for nearly twelve years. He came here in 1972 at the age of thirteen at the behest of his parents to live with relatives. His parents sent him here on a false passport. Now Aurangzeb is being threatened with removal for entering the country by deception. At the age of thirteen, however, Aurangzeb was not responsible for the deception nor was he in a position to contradict his parents' wishes. His only crime was to obey his parents and go where they sent him.

Since then Aurangzeb has built his life in Bradford. In 1976 he returned to Pakistan to visit his parents. Whilst he was there his parents tried to arrange a marriage for him. He refused and returned to the U.K. In 1979 Aurangzeb married his wife. Unfortunately, this was against the will of his elders. His parents told him to come to Pakistan immediately and renounce his marriage. He refused and was disowned. Subsequently, someone reported him to the Home Office.

Aurangzeb entered the country before the coming into effect of the 1971 Immigration Act (this came into force in 1973). Aurangzeb could have claimed amnesty status but for the fact that he left the country in 1976, which is the date the Home Office take as the date of his illegal entry. Aurangzeb has already taken his case to the High Court and was turned down. He is now considering taking it to the Court of Appeal and the European Court of Human Rights. However, the Defence Committee believes that we need a strong and sustained public campaign to save him from this terrible fate. We believe that Aurangzeb should be allowed to remain because:

1. As a child he was not responsible for any deception. He should not be punished for his parents' behaviour.
2. His wife has the right to remain. He has two young British-citizen children who cannot be removed.
3. Aurangzeb's life is in this country.
4. Removing Aurangzeb (removal is an administrative deportation without any right of appeal) would inhumanly divide his family.
5. Aurangzeb is a victim of racist laws which should be opposed.

We appeal to you to help him.
