More than 50 black people are deported every week. Black families are divided by refusing entry to husbands and children. In contrast white immigrants have few problems; for example Zola Budd was granted citizenship in 10 days! The Immigration Laws are designed to attack the rights of black people. They are Racist.

No legal rights

Most black people have no right of appeal in the courts. Some people, like Masoom Ali Shah, can't even appeal to the Home Office-appointed adjudicators. When Kamal Kumar was allowed to appeal to the Court of Appeal on a point of law, he was abused, the point of law was ignored and his appeal thrown out by Lord Justice Laughton, who was once a candidate for the British Union of Fascists!

Harassment

The Police and Immigration Officers are given wide powers to harass black people. Five Immigration Officers turned up at Rosmina and Mohammed's house at 8 o'clock one Sunday. Viraj, an anti-racist activist, had his passport confiscated by the police, the DHSS tried to cut off his money and he has been threatened with arrest for 'looking at' a policeman.

 $\underline{\underline{\text{All}}}$ black people's rights are undermined by the immigration laws-Britain's apartheid laws. Under these laws:

- 1. Black people are held indefinately in detention centres.
- 2. The police can enter houses without a warrant.
- 3. The DHSS, Hospitals and other government departments demand to see black peoples' passports.

Join the Fightback!

More and more black people attacked under the Immigration Laws are deciding to fight back. Recently three defence campaigns in Manchester have won by publicly demonstrating the widespread support they won in their communities. The defence campaigns in Manchester have united to call the 23rd March demonstration against all deportations and all attacks on black families. This is an opportunity for all of us, black and white, to make a stand against racism. With our support the defence campaigns will defeat the Home Office's racist attacks.






NIGAT BUTT, who has lived here for 20 years and became a British citizen 10 years ago, met and engaged Tariq Mahmood in 1979. The Home Office have continually refused Tariq entry from Pakistan claiming that his 'primary intent' in coming here is not his marriage to Nigat.




MANZURA BIBI was born in the UK and has lived here all her life. On a visit to Pakistan in 1982 she met Abdullah Shah, a marriage was arranged and Abdullah applied to come to the UK. After interviewing both Manzura and Abdullah, in seperate coutries, a year later the Home Office refused his application, saying his 'primary intent' in coming here was not marriage.




KAMAL KUMAR is now under very serious threat of deportation, because his marriage broke down, even though the rules say he should be allowed to stay. In January, the Court of Appeal turned down his application for judicial review of his case.



MASOOM ALI SHAH came here last August to study computing. Even though he had a letter confirming his college place and proof of financial support, immigration officials ruled he was not a 'genuine student' and would 'probably abscond' at the end of his course. He has no right of appeal against the attempt to deport him.




VIRAJ MENDIS, a supporter of 'Fight Racism!Fight Imperial-ism!', had his passport confiscated by the police last June. He has lived here for 11 years but now the Home Office want to deport him to Sri Lanka, where he faces almost certain imprisonment for his support for the oppressed Tamil people.




ROSMINA BANU RANDERA and MOHAMMED AZHAR

Rosmina came here in 1982 from Tanzania and was granted residency. Mohammed came here in 1982 on a visit. The couple met, married in 1983 and have had a child. Now the Home Office want to deport him because Rosmina, though she holds a British passport, is a second-class, 'British Overseas' citizen as a result of the Nationality Act.



The ASLAM FAMILY are threatened with deportation even though Mr Aslam came here in 1973, Mrs Aslam arrived in 1974 and all their three children, aged 6, 2 and 10 months were born here. Both of Mrs Aslam's elderly parents, who are permanent residents here, are seriously ill and heavily dependent on her.



MANDA KUNDA fled from her husband because of the extreme violence and cruelty he has been inflicting on her and her three children for years. She is threatened with deportation and if she is forced to return to Zambia she would find herself without support and in great danger. Her children would pass into the hands of her husband's mother.
